- Ensuring access and discoverability of our holdings
- Expanding our user base
- Mitigating silences existing in our collections
- Connecting the community to the Northwest Room through innovative education and outreach strategies

The Northwest Room made significant progress in all of these areas this year and continued to solidify our reputation as a vibrant community resource and leader in cultural heritage preservation.

This report summarizes our accomplishments in 2023 and establishes priorities for the coming year.

## GRANTS, AWARDS, AND LEADERSHIP

In 2023, the work of the Northwest Room and Community Archives Center was recognized locally and nationally. We completed several grant projects and were awarded new grants to launch projects over the next year. Through the development and release of the Community Archives Center Toolkit, the work of Tacoma Public Library was shared and recognized nationally within the library and archives fields.

- The Northwest Room received the Leadership in Preservation Award from the Tacoma Landmarks Preservation Committee.
- The two-year Community Archives Center project was completed in August 2023. The
  project, which received a \$250,000 grant from the Institute for Museum and Library Services,
  exceeded all deliverables outlined in the application. The Tacoma community now has access
  to thousands of new community-centered digital items and over 200 oral histories and
  interviews.
- The Community Archives Center project team presented at the Washington Library
   Association Conference in Wenatchee, the American Library Association Conference in
   Chicago, and as part of the BiblioCommons Workshop Series.
- The Northwest Room was awarded a Heritage Grant from the City of Tacoma Historic Preservation Office.
- The Northwest Room was awarded an Archival Projects grant from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission.



# COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT AND ACCESS

Over 320 collections have now been made publicly available in Northwest ORCA, giving users unprecedented access to the library's archival holdings. Thousands of documents, photographs, and audio/video recordings were digitized and made accessible including photographs from the Tacoma News Tribune, documents from the papers of several Tacoma mayors, records related to ASARCO, films of local events, and much more. Hundreds of boxes of irreplaceable documents and photographs were re-housed, arranged, and described according to archival best practices. Newly available collections include personal papers, family papers, photograph collections, business records, organizational records, and local periodicals. New collections were acquired including the photographs of Christopher Petrich, the records of the Martinac Shipbuilding Company, and more.

## **OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT**

To expand our user base and raise awareness about TPL's archives and special collections, the Northwest Room and Community Archives Center engaged in a variety of outreach activities in 2023. Our goal was to liberate our collections beyond the walls of the library and to create opportunities to connect with the community in new and exciting ways. Some of these activities included:

- Held Hilltop Story Fest, a full-day community event focused on documenting and sharing stories of the Hilltop neighborhood.
- Led Artists in the Archives, an innovative new program which connected artists to Northwest Room collections to help inform and inspire their artwork.
- Hosted neighborhood preservation events in the South Tacoma, South End, West End, North End, Northeast, and Eastside communities.
- Participated in community events and hosted preservation stations at A Proud Heritage:
   African American Family History Event, Metro Parks Community Listening Sessions, City of Destiny Festival, and more.
- Introduced mobile pop-up exhibits as a way to connect the community to Northwest Room collections. Exhibits were held at the T-Town Expo and Dome Anniversary Celebration, Hilltop Street Fair, Steen Family Symposium on Environmental Issues, Historic Cushman Street Fair, and more.
- Appeared on TV Tacoma's Cityline three times to discuss Northwest Room and Community Archives Center projects.

### **EDUCATION**

Local history collections play an important role in supporting lifelong learning. In 2023, we worked with educators across Pierce County to find ways to facilitate transformational encounters between students and archival materials. We also led teacher training and developed lesson plans to provide opportunities for educators to connect their students to the Northwest Room's collections. Educational projects undertaken in 2023 include:

- Led a full day workshop for over 100 Tacoma Public Schools teachers. "Grit City Stories:
   The Untold Tales of Tacoma" demonstrated for teachers how to engage their students in local history by discovering, documenting, and learning from stories that have been underrepresented in our local history narrative.
- Provided in class instruction for nearly 600 local students, including middle school, high school, and undergraduates.
- Developed lesson plans and primary source sets for classroom use.
- Participated in Educator's Night to share information with teachers from across the region about instructional support offered by the Northwest Room.
- Hosted eight student internships for undergraduate and graduate students with an interest in local history and future careers in special collections.

#### **PROGRESS ON GOALS FOR 2023**

- The Community Archives Center Toolkit was published and broadly shared. The toolkit will serve as a model for other libraries interested in pursuing similar projects in their own communities. The Project Team led workshops and was interviewed on the Archives in Context podcast about the toolkit.
- Continued to move toward fully accessible and discoverable Northwest Room collections through digitization and arrangement and description projects.
- Increased community partnerships and outreach activities.
- Expanded educational programs for K-12 students in partnership with Tacoma Public Schools, Bethel School District, and Franklin Pierce School District.

#### **GOALS FOR 2024**

- Streamline access and improve discoverability of Northwest Room collections through metadata improvements and full migration to a single access portal.
- Continue to reduce backlog of unprocessed collections and moving towards fully accessible holdings.
- Become embedded within Tacoma Public Schools' curriculum ensuring that every Tacoma student interacts with Northwest Room collections as part of their educational journey.
