2024 categories & definitions

- 1. Article of clothing in the title
- 2. Author who has a relative that is also an author (Author 1)
 - a. Relatives are connected by blood, marriage, adoption, etc.
 - b. This includes in-laws and stepfamilies
 - c. Example: Parent and child, Siblings, Spouses, Cousins, Grandparent and grandchild, etc.
 - d. Example Author 1: Stephen King & Author 2 Joe Hill
- 3. Author who has a relative that is also an author (Author 2)
 - a. See description for Category #2
- 4. Author whose name contains an animal
 - a. Example: Dick Wolf, Destiny O. Birdsong, Bear Grylls
- 5. Author you think is under rated
- 6. Author you would name a child or pet after
- 7. Based on a true story
- 8. Bildungsroman
 - Genre that focuses on the psychological and moral growth of the protagonist from childhood to adulthood
 - b. Also called a coming-of-age story
- 9. Body of water depicted on the cover
 - a. Any significant accumulation of water on the surface of a planet
 - b. This can include oceans, seas, lakes, ponds, etc.
- 10. Book you wish you could read again for the first time
- 11. Book you would read in a café
- 12. Book you've been waiting for (or anticipating)
- 13. Booker Prize winner or shortlist nominee
 - a. The Booker Prize is awarded to works of fiction written in English and published in the UK and Ireland

- 14. Cake on the cover
- 15. Centers the Arab and/or Arab American experience
 - a. Arab is an ethno-linguistic category, identifying people who speak the Arabic language
 - Arab countries include Algeria, Bahrain, Comoros, Djibouti, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Libya, Mauritania, Morocco, Oman, Palestine, Israel, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Tunisia, United Arab Emirates, and Yemen
- 16. Character who shares your initials
- 17. Character who is a president of a nation
- 18. Character you could fall in love with
- 19. Choose a book of your liking
- 20. Dark Academia

- a. Genre that focuses on the pursuit of knowledge and usually features a dark twist
- 21. Describes a party
- 22. Exceeded your expectations
- 23. Eye/s on the cover
- 24. Features a famous landmark
 - a. Example: Angkor Wat, Big Ben, Space Needle, Taj Mahal, etc.
- 25. Features a mistaken identity
- 26. Found the title in a magazine or online article
- 27. From an author who passed away in 2023
- 28. Gritty
 - a. A story described in an intense and starkly realistic way, often depicting violence or other dark themes
- 29. Hyphenated author name
 - a. Two names paired together with a between them.
 - b. Ex. Silvia Moreno-Garcia, Lin-Manuel Miranda
- 30. Includes a competition
- 31. Includes a dedication
- 32. Includes hockey
- 33. Includes recipes
- 34. Lambda Literary Awards winner or finalist
 - a. The Lambda Literary Awards are awarded to the best LGBTQ literature

- 35. Made you angry
- 36. Mood-boosting
- 37. One of the 5 Ws in the title
 - a. The 5 Ws are: Who, What, When, Where, Why
 - b. Can be any iteration of the words:
 - i. Who (who's, whose, whom, whomever)
 - ii. What (what's, whatever)
 - iii. When (when's, whenever)
 - iv. Where (where's, whereas, whereof, wherever)
 - v. Why (whys, why's, whyever)
- 38. Orange cover (at least 50%)
- 39. Other in the title
 - a. Can be any iteration of the word:
 - i. Others, otherwise, otherworldly, othering, etc.
- 40. Photograph/snapshot on the cover
- 41. Popcorn Thriller
 - a. A subgenre of mystery
 - b. Typically are suspenseful, entertaining, and lighter in content
- 42. Rags to riches
- 43. Saw someone else reading
- 44. Set in a gym or health studio
- 45. Set in a place that no longer exists or has changed names
 - a. Countries, cities, regions, or other places that existed in the past, but have become new places or changed names since.

- b. Examples: Soviet Union (Ukraine, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Russia, etc.), Burma (presently Myanmar), Constantinople (presently Istanbul)
- 46. Set in Cuba
- 47. Set in the Midwestern United States
 - a. This area includes Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin
- 48. Stand-alone book
- 49. The 2024 Tacoma Reads adult or teen title
 - a. Tacoma Reads is a city-wide reading program through a longstanding partnership and collaboration between the City of Tacoma's Mayor's Office and the Tacoma Public Library. It seeks to unite the community in dialogue around contemporary themes through reading a common text.

- 52. Title you think is terrible
- 53. Takes place during the Tudor Era (1485-1603)
- 54. Type of dwelling in the title
 - a. Example: Bungalow, flat, houseboat, hut, etc.
- 55. Women's Prize for Fiction
 - a. The Women's Prize for Fiction is awarded to novels written in English by women from anywhere in the world. It is awarded by women.
